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HOPE App

The Highland Alcohol and Drugs Partnership has

developed an app to help reduce drug-related harm and deaths across the north of Scotland.

The Highland Overdose Prevention and Engagement (HOPE) app has been created with input from people with lived experience and a range of experts from NHS Highland and beyond.

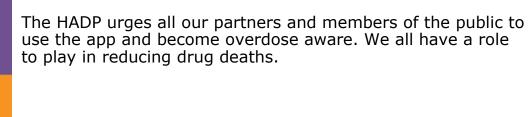
<u> Engagement</u>

The HOPE app is a source of information for people with drug and or alcohol problems, as well as their families or friends, which helps prevent overdose and encourages engagement with services that can help.

It contains information on what to do in an emergency overdose situation for both depressant and stimulant drugs. Harm reduction information and details on how to contact a range of support services are also available on the app.

The HOPE app is a collaborative project involving Highland Alcohol and Drugs Partnership (HADP), NHS Highland Public Health, Health Improvement, Highland Alcohol and Drug Advice and Support Service (HADASS) and Scottish Families Affected by Alcohol and Drugs (SFAD), who are all members of the Highland Drug Related Death Prevention Group. The content of the app was developed with input from a range of experts, including the aforementioned teams, plus HMP Inverness

and Crew.

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HADP Support Team Staff Changes



As many of you may already be aware I am starting a two-year secondment on 1st February 2022 with the Scottish Prison Service as their Drug and Alcohol Recovery Lead within the Health-Justice Division, Strategy and Justice Directorate.

This will be a great opportunity to develop my experience working at a strategic level leading on the development and implementation of a drug and alcohol recovery pathway framework and strategy to support people with drug and alcohol problems within custodial settings. The role will contribute to the national priority to reduce deaths and will involve collaborating with key partners to improve access, support, and the delivery of evidence-based interventions. I will also support the

implementation of Medication Assisted Treatment Standards from within a custodial environment across establishments. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the Partner organisations, colleagues, and people in recovery who I have had the pleasure of working with over these last 7 years with HADP, too many to name individually. Your dedication and contribution to improve the health and wellbeing of people, and families who experience problems with alcohol and drugs is inspirational and I look forward to working with you all again in the future.

<u>Drugs Deaths Taskforce</u> New Chair and Vice-Chair

The Minister for Drugs Policy has now announced the appointment of former Chief Nursing Officer Professor Fiona McQueen as Vice-Chair of the Drug Deaths Taskforce. Earlier today the Taskforce held its first meeting with David Strang as Chair. The Taskforce discussed their work plan for the coming six months when it aims to publish a Road Map and suite of detailed reports. Further updates will be provided in due course.

Community Justice Scotland

We're delighted to announce the launch of an online resource detailing community support services available across Scotland for people impacted by the justice system.

The <u>Community Support Services tool</u> gives a factual overview of the range of community services in each of the 32 Scottish local authority areas.

The information is provided by local Community Justice Partnerships and collated by Community Justice Scotland. It includes details on sentencing measures such as Community Payback Orders, Drug Treatment and Testing Orders, Structured Deferred Sentences, Bail Supervision, Third Sector Programmes and other relevant statutory services and interventions. Users can search for the information by local authority area.

The aim is to make it easier for those working across the justice sector, and beyond, to see what services are available to support individuals navigating the justice system in different parts of Scotland. It is an ongoing project and includes information supplied at this time which we recognise will change and improve. It will be updated on a regular basis. Working with Alcohol and Anxiety Together: Exploring the knowledge and skills to work with alcohol and anxiety in the community

Description: This half day seminar is aimed at managers and frontline workers from health, social care services and voluntary sector services who are interested in exploring the relationship between alcohol and anxiety as a part of the community recovery from Covid-19. The workshop will be a mix of presentations and discussion groups and will cover how anxiety and alcohol interact; how anxiety and alcohol use presents in practice and how this has been impacted by Covid-19; the skills we use in responding to anxiety and alcohol use; and what we need to enable us to do this better.

Target Audience: This event has been developed to support managers and frontline workers from health, social care and voluntary sector services who are working with people who have alcohol and alcohol dependency issues and would like to know more about the relationship between alcohol and anxiety. 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COVID 19 Vaccination / Booster

"Make sure you're protected from COVID-19 – get your vaccination now "With the emergence of the Omicron variant of COVID-19, it's more important than ever that you get vaccinated or – if you've already done so – you get your booster, and make sure that you get the protection you need. "The good news is that access to getting vaccinated is easier than ever, with increased drop in and pop-up clinics provided by Health Boards in local communities. You can find details of clinics available in your area on NHS Inform here. "You can also choose a clinic outside your local NHS Health Board area or call the national vaccination helpline on 0800 030 8013. "Please be reassured that the vaccinators are trained medical professionals who will answer all your questions in a non-judgmental and welcoming manner. They won't ask you about drug or alcohol use. And you can also ask to be vaccinated in a quiet area

SHAAP Knowledge Exchange Webinar

Scottish Health Action on Alcohol Problems (SHAAP) invite you to <u>join us online</u> on **Wednesday 23 February from 14:00-16:00 GMT** for a knowledge exchange webinar on Managed Alcohol Programmes (MAPs).

MAPs originate in Canada and are designed for people who are homeless and have an Alcohol Use Disorder (AUD). They focus on harm prevention by providing measured, regular doses of alcohol and people in MAPs are often provided with mental and physical healthcare and access to other services. The Simon Community is introducing Scotland's first formal MAP, in Glasgow.

This webinar aims to exchange knowledge and allow discussion to equip people and organisations who work with homeless people and/or people with AUDs with knowledge on MAPs, how they work, what makes them work, what should be taken into account, and lessons that have been learned in Canada, London and in the early stages of development of the MAP in Glasgow.
